CLINICS

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Preparations are in the works for our upcoming clinics this year. We're expanding to quarterly clinics, up from three last year. So, we should significantly increase the total of 2,253 lifesaving inoculations that were administered in 2024, all free with the kind donations of vaccinations by Petco Love. Many also received rabies shots and microchips provided by New Beginnings. Our first clinic of 2025 will take place in Winton in March, followed by Livingston, Los Banos and Planada.



Our ever-popular annual bake sale made its highly anticipated return last December 14, once again at the Merced Multicultural Arts Center. The black box theater there is a very large room that we completely fill with the hugest assortment of delicacies imaginable, plus decorated holiday wreaths and trees, gift items and New Beginnings hoodies. Thank you, volunteers, for all your hard work setting up the day before and carrying on the next day. Bringing in a little over \$10,000, you can see that this "ain't your mama's bake sale!"

At the same time as the bake sale, we had a fundraiser going on at the Habit Restaurant in Merced. For everyone submitting a flyer or showing one on their phone to the cashier, we were given 20% of their total purchase. Thanks to some valiant volunteers who braved the icy cold wind to hand out flyers, we brought in another \$330. We are already looking forward to this year's sale scheduled for December 13th, our third year at the Art Center.

It was newsworthy enough to be covered by all major news channels. And heartbreaking enough to elicit tears. Recently, in a week's time, three dogs in our area have received gunshot wounds.

The first one happened on February 3rd. The little victim was a terrier that was shot through the eye and shoulder. The vets were able to remove the pellets from the shoulder, but not the eye. She is being adopted and her new name, Hope, could not be more fitting.

The next day a Great Pyrenees was shot. Like Hope, this occurred within the city limits of Merced on a major street. Incomprehensible! She was shot between the eyes with a large caliber gun and left for dead. Fortunately, she was found in time by some people who contacted the city. She was treated at Valley Animal Hospital where her recuperation required a month's stay. Flea-infested and emaciated, it was obvious that her life had not been easy. Yet the next day after her arrival at Valley, she was already slowly wagging her tail, showing the spirit that has kept her alive so far. A few days later, Grace, as she is now known, was actually walking outside, reveling in the sunshine. It just takes your breath away. When she is ready for adoption, her new owners must guarantee that she is primarily an inside dog with a safe yard outside where she can bask in the sun.

The third dog, Raz, is a German Shepherd mix who was found by a vet tech on her back doorstep waiting with her dogs and cats for breakfast! X-rays on his left foreleg showed twelve bullets. Consultation with an orthopedic specialist confirmed our worst expectations—the leg couldn't be saved. To try to do so would put him through a long and torturous recovery with a dismal prognosis. Raz is in good company with many three-legged canines who don't appear to notice the difference! Despite being an older gentleman, he is energetic, sweet, friendly with strangers and awaiting an adopter who will appreciate his finer qualities.

Andy Krotik and his team, staunch supporters of New Beginnings and avid animal lovers, are once again holding a drive-thru chicken dinner to help defray costs. Only 350 tickets will be sold so Andy suggests, "Hurry-we always sell out!" We always need donations for medical care, as our bills can be as much as \$15,000 a month. Where it's natural to feel so helpless in situations such as these, it's a way to feel a part of the cure.

She then presents a choice of two charities and gives background information on each. The students make their selections and then create a card to send to their charity of choice. Each year New Beginnings has been one of the two selections.

The cards they create are bright with promise as you can see by the examples here. And it's easy to tell that they have internalized the lesson by some of the things they say in their notes. "You give animals a proper home," says Jakzenny. Marco agrees, adding, "I love all the animals you have found and helped them to survive," and April "wants them to have a comfy bed." I love how there is a center like this in my area," states Malesa and Cole supports that idea by saying that he hopes we "continue to house these animals in a new home."
